



Subjects: History of Christmas

Now normally when thinking about christmas you would think about the Christmas Tree, or the Nativity set, or many other things. But did you ever wonder how our ancestors did?

Ancient Roman

When talking about the Romans the first thing that comes to mind is the large empire they used to hold, however the Christmas story goes back very long ago for the romans. Saturnalia, as they called it, was an ancient Roman festival and holiday to honour the agricultural god, Saturn. This was held on the 17th of December of the Julian calendar and later expanded with festivities through 19th December. By the 1st century B.C., the celebration had been extended through 23 December, for a total of seven days of festivities. This is the source of many of the traditions we now associate with Christmas such as wreaths, candles, feasting and gift giving.

HOWEVER, a quite interesting thing also happened. A theory suggests that Emperor Constantine and the Catholic Church in Rome, Italy, began celebrating Christmas on December 25 in 336 C.E. to replace the pagan celebrations. Nevertheless, several ancient manuscripts and theories reveal that the original celebrations of Christmas began even earlier than 336 C.E..

Other interesting facts also include:

The Pagan name for Christmas was Yule, also called Jul, jol or joulu.

A sacrifice of young pigs was made during the festivities.

Slaves during the Roman period also were allowed to celebrate this festival and even didn't have to work!

As a way of celebrating this festival, people decorated their homes and temples with evergreen boughs to mark the green and fruitful arrival yet to come in the farms.



Medieval England

Long ago, before a man with a red outfit and gifts to give out under Christmas trees, the Medieval English spent Christmas differently! Like our Roman traditions the Medieval English engaged in the tradition of gift-giving, doing this practice would continue on even until now. As well, beautiful Church services were enjoyed and merry feasts with delicious food and the most out of the whole year around England. As well there were plenty of dancing and music of the time period and much like today they had pantomimes and games too. Christmas was the best time of the year and not just for the wealthy but also for all classes of society as it was the longest holiday of the year. In fact the holiday was long enough for people to go outside and even play snow fights as a 14th century painting from Trento, Italy depicts.

As early as the 10th century, an Anglo-Saxon poem recounted the key points of the festive season: 'Christ was born ar midwinter [the winter solstice], eight days before the Roman New Year of 1st of January. Five days after New Year [6th January] came Christ's baptism, known as Twelfth Day in England'.

Tudor England

Tudor's, huh? You might be thinking that you've heard that before. Well it wasn't all bloodthirsty Kings and Queens as when it came to Christmas they were all holly and jolly.

Firsty during this time Carols flourished as ways to celebrate Christmas and spread the story of the Nativity. These include many songs we sing to this da such as:

'As shepherds watched their flock by night'
'The holly'
'The ivy'
'Away in a manger'

Just to mention a few, and as always no-one worked. Another interesting fact is the banned activity of spinning, an enormous pastime for many women as the 12 days had extremely strict rules. During the Twelve Days, people would visit their neighbours sharing and enjoying the traditional 'mince pie'. The pies would have included thirteen ingredients, representing Christ and his apostles, typically dried fruits, spices and of course a little chopped mutton - in remembrance of the shepherds.

Also you might be wondering where did the word carol derive from? It is derived from the Latin 'caraula' or the French 'carole', and its original meaning is the same, a dance with a song. In fact the earliest recorded published collection of carols is in 1521 by Winken de Worde which includes the Boar's Head Carol. Tudor Christmas also saw homes decorated on Christmas Eve with mistletoe, holly, ivy and laurel.

Victorian England

Before Victoria's reign started in 1837 nobody in Britain had heard of Santa Claus or Christmas Crackers and no exchanging cards. The wealth and technologies generated by the industrial revolution of the Victorian era changed the face of Christmas forever. Sentimental do-gooders like Charles Dickens wrote books like "Christmas Carol", published in 1843, which actually encouraged rich Victorians to redistribute their wealth by giving money and gifts to the poor. These radical middle class ideals eventually spread to the not-quite-so-poor as well.

The Industrial Revolution led mass production of toys and ornaments which could now be more affordable for the middle-class. However in a 'poor child's' stocking they would at least get an apple, orange and a few nuts could be found.

BUT LISTEN HERE. Normally associated with the bringer of the above gifts, is Father Christmas or Santa Claus. The two are in fact two entirely separate stories. Father Christmas was originally part of an old English midwinter festival, normally dressed in green, a sign of the returning spring. The stories of St. Nicholas (Sinter Klaas in Holland) came via Dutch settlers to America in the 17th Century. From the 1870's Sinter Klass became known in Britain as Santa Claus and with him came his unique gift and toy distribution system - reindeer and sleigh.

AS WELL THE CHRISTMAS TREE was introduced to England when Queen Victoria married her German husband, Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha who was also her cousin in 1840. Ever since then Prince Albert made the Christmas tree a popular staple in England as they were in his native Germany, when he brought one to Windsor Castle in the 1840's

ALSO THE CHRISTMAS CRACKERS which was invented by Tom Smith, a London sweet maker in 1846. The original idea was that there were sweets in them but it was made more popular if they had love notes, paper hats and small toys that when you pulled them they went BANG! <u>Carol singers</u>- and musicians often called 'The Waits' visited houses singing and playing the new popular carols such as:

1843-O come all ye faithful

1848-Once in Royal David's

City

1851- See Amid The Winter's Snow Bethlehem 1868-O Little Town Of

Christmas around the world:



You could listen to them and treat them how they want to be treated. No two neurodivergent people are the same as each other.


Don't assume that anyone is incapable or unintelligent as they are not the same as you.
